Project Description:

The Partition of Identity (POI) project examines the Pakistani Bengali community, tracing its history and exploring how, in their everyday lives, its members traverse the space between being Pakistani and being Bengali. We focus on those Pakistani Bengalis who arrived in Pakistan in the 1970s, following the creation of Bangladesh in 1971, and their children and grandchildren who were born in Pakistan. Estimates suggest that there are between 2.8-3 million members of this group living in Pakistan, but numbers are likely to be much higher. This is the first time a study has explored this community in such depth and has captured the accounts of members across generations.

The Partition of Identity (POI) project asks:

- 1. How are Pakistani Bengalis historically and culturally represented in Pakistan?
- 2. How do these social representations and lack of citizenship rights influence how Pakistani Bengalis describe their identity and sense of belonging to Pakistan?
- 3. What forms of resistance have people from these groups developed in response to the lack of citizenship rights and access to resources?
- 4. How do members of the younger generations of Pakistani Bengalis understand the migration history and subsequent lives of their parents and grandparents, and how do they relate this to their own lived experiences in Pakistan?

Our partners were involved to differing degrees in the 3 research phases. In Phase 1 we conducted a strategic search through historical, policy and media documents for dominant depictions of the community. This informed the oral history interview work in Phases 2, with 55 adults and 30 young people. We also conducted art workshops with young people, gathering information on community representation. In Phase 3, artists and musicians reimagined both state representation and also community representations to produce new outputs based on the community. To date we have created and developed a new oral history archive, art and music based on the research, a documentary, a website, an online exhibition, museum exhibitions, a children's book, animation, media articles, and published workⁱ





Timeline- Outputs and Impacts

March 2022- Filming of the documentary begins

April 2022 – Art workshops with children at Khel School (4 workshops, in collaboration with two artists), followed by an exhibition of the children's work in Machar Colony for community members. The exhibition was titled 'Adhoori Shanakht' (Suspended Identity)

May 2022 – A series of art workshops led by Iqbal and Hasan in partnership with Indus Valley School of Arts and Architecture. Artists were shortlisted to take part in the workshop and material from here would form part of the Paper Boats exhibition

Further Details of Outputs

Oral History Archive

Oral history interviews were conducted in Karachi with 55 adult members of the community. Community members were of different ages, belonged to varying social strata, and exhibited diverse levels of political participation. Interviews were also conducted with 30 young individuals from the community (aged 13 to 18), where possible, from the same households as the adults, to ensure a comprehensive understanding of familial and social dynamics Interviews were conducted in a range of field sites including Machar Colony (District Kemari), Zia Colony (District East), Moosa Colony (District Central), Tasier town (District Malir), Orangi Town (District West) and Ibrahim Hyderi (District Korangi). The interviews and accompanying artifacts have been anonymised and will be made available to researchers and the public to access. Consent was obtained by participants for this. It will be the largest collection of oral history interviews from the community to date.

Art Workshops with Young People



Adhoori Shanakht- Exploring Identity & Citizenship in Pakistani Bengalis through Art

Year: Spring 2022

Artists involved: Amani Noor and Ahsan Javaid

Description: Artists Amani Noor and Ahsan Javaid co-led these workshops with POI team

members. During the workshops, the young people explored their environment, experiences of living in Machar colony and by the coast, the citizenship challenges they face, their identity, and their hopes for the future. The workshops ended with an exhibition at the school attended by community members. My Neighbourhood - Ceramic Workshop run by artist Amani Noor

Twelve young people aged 8-10 took part in this workshop which involved painting

ceramics following a discussion and exercise about their neighbourhood and some of the challenges they face. The workshop also captured some of the knowledge children had relating to their surrounding costal environment. Many of the children's families are involved in the fishing industry.







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Me and my dream - An arts workshop led by Amani Noor and Ahsan Javid.

This workshop involved young people (40 children, all ages) who created a portrait that was in the format of an identity card photograph and another image of what they would like to be when they grow up. This workshop involved a discussion around some of the challenges associated with lack of identity status and citizenship in achieving one's goals. The images which were then painted on slates by the young people, were used to create a mural for the school. The workshops involved detailed discussions about key issues faced by the children and sparked multiple questions.



Letters to the PM - an arts workshop led by Ahsan Javaid and POI

letters addressed to the Prime Minister of Pakistan were developed during this workshop. The letters serve as a direct appeal to the government to take account of some of the challenges faced by Pakistani Bengali young people and their families linked to issues of citizenship and statelessness. These include access to education, employment, lack of opportunities and lack of infrastructure in their neighbourhoods. The letters were posted to the PM and also used for an advocacy campaign (described later).







The SCIT (Synallactic Collective Image Technique) Workshop:

This arts therapy-based workshop was led by Humera Iqbal and used the Synallactic Collective Image Technique with a series of 12 young people. Each participant shared a personal story around 'Life in Machar Colony' and each of these stories were then weaved together in a central tale. The final story and pictures made by group members was used to create a comic (detailed later).

Description: These workshops took place with artists from Indus Valley School of Arts and Architecture. A group of shortlisted artists were introduced to the project research and were asked to reimagine this in different art forms. A series of field visits also took place, including to Machar Colony and Karachi harbour. The workshops were led Humera Iqbal, Anushay Malik, and artist Irfan Hasan and provided a unique platform for participants to engage deeply with the thematic concerns of identity, statelessness, and cultural expression of the Pakistani Bengali community based on research findings. An accompanying film was created which documented the workshops and the artwork that was created.



The Others – An Animation by Adan Shaikh


Description: The Others is an animated social commentary that depicts the impact of having one's identity taken away. The animation explores issues of 'othering', citizenship, and statelessness faced by members of the Pakistani Bengali community living in Karachi including those from Machar Colony. Everyday struggles such as accessing education and employment opportunities are shown. The film also delves into the impact of being considered foreign or 'alien', labels often associated with this group.

About the artist: Adan Shaikh is a Karachi based illustrator, new media, and visual artist who works with both digital and traditional art mediums. Her artistic practices primarily focus on gender, class, and identity discrimination prevalent in Pakistan. Adan documents and navigates the lack of safe public spaces for women and the role of women in a patriarchal society. She graduated from the Indus Valley School of Arts and Architecture in 2022.





Monsters Behind Vines: A collection of Tales - Areeba Aslam



Artist Statement: Storytelling conveys the culture, history, and values that unite people. The artist collected tales either imagined or shared by children from the Pakistani Bengali community. While speaking with students from Khel school in Machar Colony, she heard accounts of jalparis (mermaids), jalparas (mermen), jinn and bhoots (ghosts). The stories bear invaluable information about spaces, culture and the imaginations of young minds.

About the Artist: Areeba Aslam is an illustrator and designer who graduated from the Indus Valley School of Art and Architecture based in Karachi Pakistan in 2022. Her interest lies in visual storytelling, with a focus on children's literature.





Captured Displacement - Axel Lucas



Artist's Note: The installation depicts some of the key localities where the community live as pockets on the map of Karachi. The work is made from recycled plywood. Using a laser engraving machine five shapes have been cut from the wood to represent Pakistani Bengali colonies in Karachi, including Musa Colony, Zia ul Haq Colony, Bilal Colony, Ibrahim Hyderi and Machar Colony. I chose these specific places to highlight historical and contemporary patterns of settlement. The colonies shown are developed to scale, with Machar Colony, which is one of the largest in size, dominating the space compared to Musa Colony. The work highlights how many Pakistani Bengalis settled near the coastlines of Karachi as many in the community are linked to fishing. The net pattern engraved on all the five mapped areas symbolises how many Pakistani Bengalis are trapped around issues of citizenship.

About the Artist: Axel Lucas is a Karachi based multidisciplinary visual artist. His work centres on identity and control in the educational system, particularly linked colonial and postcolonial authority. His practice is expressed through installations and large-scale wall drawings. Working with different mediums, he is interested in creating visuals of restriction, repetition, conditioning, and the idea of critiquing authority. Axel recently received the Emerging Artist Award at the Karachi Artfest 2023.

About the Artist: Syeda Yumna Fatima is a 4th year fine arts student from the Indus Valley School of Art and Architecture based in Karachi Pakistan.

The dark imagery here depicts the challenges faced by many Pakistani Bengalis living in Machar Colony, particularly around citizenship, but also around access to infrastructure and basic resources. These challenges impact entire families and generations. In the piece, with a little focus you can see that there is a tree branching out, symbolizing the notion of family, genealogy, and connection.

The sea is a key source of income and life for many from Machar Colony. Fish is a staple food and central to livelihoods. For fishermen, the journey of going out to sea on large wooden boats can be long and challenging. The crew is often at the mercy of nature and the vast expanse of the sea. Local folklore, music and fishermen's tales passed down to families, also capture the mysticism of the sea. In my piece I have tried to capture the many dimensions of the sea in the lives of Machar Colony dwellers.

Adjacent to the densely populated area of Machar colony lie the mangroves which provide flood protection from the Arabian Sea. Poverty has forced some to build homes on stilts here, resulting in deforestation and outwards expansion into 'The Jungle'. This piece provides a reminder of the strong but also fragile connection between man and nature, particularly of the impact of climate change on rising water levels, the aquatic ecosystem and in turn the number of fish in the water.



Jalpari - Abdul Rehman

Artist Statement: This piece was inspired by the connection between human-beings and the sea. While drawing a human figure and thinking of the fishing and the sea, Rehman was able to merge the two together to create "jalpari".

About the Artist: Abdul Rehman is a self-taught artist based in Machar Colony, Karachi. He attends school at Imkaan Welfare Organization's learning and recreational centre, Khel.

About the Artist: Abdullah Khan is a Pakistani independent filmmaker whose work deals with exploring unconventional topics and creating an impact. Khan's aim is to explore narratives that seem simple from the outside but at the same time hold a complex structure within. Abdullah started a career in filmmaking to tell stories about childhood, silenced voices, and unnoticed traumas, using a naturalistic style. He graduated from the Indus Valley School of Arts and Architecture in 2022.

Artist's Note: This photo series is inspired by the Arabian sea and the beasts that chart its rough waters. Hands that blister and reveal open wounds craft these very beasts. The ships portrayed in this piece are made by hand, measured by careful approximation showing the true power of what man can achieve when our differences are set aside, and we work as one.




'Think in your hea, think' - A comic book on statelessness



This collaboration between social psychologist Humera Iqbal and illustrator-as-historian Kremena Dimitrova, is a 15 double-page limited edition comic book published by Markings.

In May 2022, Humera ran an arts therapy-based workshop with teenagers from Khel School in Machar Colony, at which each young person developed stories around the topic, "My Life in Machar Colony" (described earlier). These provided the basis for a script produced by Kremena, which she brought to life by interweaving the young people's drawings together with archival material. Traversing the personal and political, this carefully constructed comic



book and educational resource, is available in English and Urdu.



About the Artist: Kremena Dimitrova is a London based illustrator-as-historian, lecturer in Visual Culture, and practice-based PhD researcher in decolonising history through comics at the University of Portsmouth. She specialises in socially engaged and site-specific creative interventions and visual storytelling in the cultural, heritage, and education sectors.

Kaghazi Kashtiyan (Paper Boats): The Pakistani Bengali Story

Kagazhi Khastiyan was an exhibition that opened up a window into the experiences of the Pakistani Bengali community. This community has long roots based mainly in the city of Karachi and spread across a variety of neibourhoods. 'Kaghazi Kashtiyan' refers to the connection of the community to the sea, through the work that many of them do as fishermen, but it also refers to the precarious, paper – like fragility of their legal status in Pakistan because of challenges that they face around documentation and citizenship. Letters to the Prime Minister

These letters addressed to the Prime Minister of Pakistan were written by Pakistani Bengali children and teenagers living in Karachi. The letters serve as a direct appeal to the government to take account of some of the challenges faced by these young people and their families linked to issues of citizenship and statelessness. These include access to education, employment, lack of opportunities and lack of infrastructure in their neighborhoods.

The letters were developed following a workshop in partnership with Imkaan Welfare Organisation and led by artist Ahsan Javaid and POI team members in 2022. They formed part of a series of art workshops held in Khel School, Machar Colony.

The LTPM social media campaign was strategically launched on Pakistan Day—a symbolic action that underscored the political and social issues related to citizenship faced by the community. This timing maximized the campaign's relevance and emotional impact and positioned it within a broader discourse on national identity and rights, thereby attracting significant attention and engagement from various stakeholders.

Over 10 days, we posted a series of letters from the young people as well as media clips from the young people reading out their letters. This strategic use of social media enabled real-time engagement with a diverse, global audience, enhancing the visibility and influence of the campaign. There is an unknown person in my family's data whose CNIC is blocked. We have been to the NADRA's (National Database and Registration Authority) office many times to get this issue resolved, but NADRA workers are not resolving this. They send us home on various pretexts. As a result of this, we cannot complete our education, we cannot work and we cannot fulfill our (daily) needs. If we cannot find work, we cannot lead a prosperous life and we cannot fulfill our dreams.

That is why I appeal to the Prime Minister of Pakistan to resolve our issue as soon as possible, so that we may lead prosperous lives and fulfill our dreams. Kindly resolve our issue.



Social Media Coverage: The analytical review of social media metrics, such as view counts, likes, shares, and the nature of comments, provides a quantifiable measure of the campaign's impact. The campaign attracted over social media over 628k views, 1633 likes and 738 shares from online users (note that this data comes from 2 key accounts). This engagement data suggests that the project effectively raised awareness and educated a broad audience about the challenges faced by the Pakistani Bengali community.\

Written evidence submitted by Institute on Statelessness and Inclusion, Imkaan Welfare Organisation and University College London on Monday 9th December 2024 International Development Committee Inquiry: In Development

The following submission represents the collated views of legal and third sector experts from the Institute on Statelessness and Inclusion¹ (ISI) and Imkaan Welfare Organisation² (Imkaan) and social science academic experts from the UCL Social Research Institute³ (SRI) at University College London (UCL).

The *ISI* is the first and the only human rights NGO dedicated to promoting the right to a nationality and the rights of stateless people globally. *Imkaan*, based in Pakistan, is an NGO that works with marginalized and stateless communities, those impacted by challenges due to poverty and identity issues, particularly women and children. Alongside the multi-disciplinary, comprehensive work conducted at the *UCL Social Research Institute*, this collective is well placed to respond to this inquiry by the IDC.

A. Executive summary

- **A.1.** Stateless people are amongst the most vulnerable and persecuted globally and fall between the cracks in relation to UK development and humanitarian efforts.
- **A.2.** Statelessness can act as a driver of conflict and refugee flows internationally and within countries.
- **A.3.** Statelessness disproportionally impacts women and children and hinders the attainment of multiple global sustainable development goals (SDGs 3, 4,5, 10 & 16).
- **A.4**. The issue of Statelessness should be examined closely by the IDC in relation to recipients of ODA spending and the requirements of LDCs and LMICs of this spending, particularly nations in South and South-East Asia, Africa and Caribbean Nations with a focus on education, rights to health care and nationality.

B. Why should the International Development Committee examine this area?

Despite the UNHCR's #IBelong campaign⁴ which aimed to eradicate statelessness by 2024, globally an estimated 15 million people⁵ continue to experience statelessness and are not considered as a national by any state under the operation of its law. Further, the nationality of tens of millions is at risk. Statelessness is an issue which needs urgent attention from the International Development Committee (IDC) from a human rights and development standpoint. Stateless individuals are vulnerable to discrimination persecution and unequal treatment and lack basic protections granted to those with nationality including access to state institutions connected with education, healthcare, social security, justice, labour protection and housing. The complexity of the issue means that it can act as a driver of conflict and refugee flows. Statelessness occurs to due to redrawing of borders, wars, states gaining independence and citizenship stripping in the name of national security. It is also caused and perpetuated by discrimination on grounds like race, ethnicity, gender and poverty. Stateless peoples often reside in the most vulnerable localities susceptible to climate change and face further risk of displacement.

C. Why is it the right time for the Committee to examine this area and why would this area benefit from parliamentary scrutiny?

Given current global political instability alongside climate-based uncertainty, now is the opportune moment for the IDC to conduct a wider investigation to examine the issue. In seeking to investigate this issue, the IDC would be addressing key UN Sustainable Development Goals, particularly SDG10 (reduced inequalities), and SDG16 (Peace, justice and strong institutions) as well as SDGs 3,4 and 5 (good health and wellbeing; access to quality education and gender equality). Given the stateless are among the most structurally disadvantaged people globally, the IDC is urged to prioritise statelessness in keeping with the core principle to 'leave no one behind'.

The hidden nature of statelessness means that stateless people are falling between the cracks in relation to the UK's development and human rights programmes. We urge that this issue is first examined closely in relation to firstly the recipients of ODA spending, and secondly the requirements of LDCs and LMICs of this spending.

No country including the UK is immune to Statelessness. However, there are certain nations with former and present close ties to the UK, including Commonwealth countries within which proportionate communities face deep challenges to their survival and thriving because of the denial of equal nationality rights and resultant statelessness. These LDCs and LMICs ODA recipient countries which warrant scrutiny

include those in **South and South-East Asia**⁶ (Pakistan⁷⁸, Nepal, Bangladesh⁹, Malaysia¹⁰, Myanmar¹¹ and India¹²) but also **Caribbean Nations** (Haiti and the Dominican Republic¹³) and **Africa** (Kenya¹⁴, South Africa¹⁵, Cote D'Ivoire).

D. How could Government policy in this area be developed or improved?

Government policy should seek to address within these nations, at a minimum, firstly the **right to education for all children** including stateless and undocumented children; ensuring that all stateless and undocumented people have **the right to public health care** and the call for **equal nationality rights** and non-discriminatory implementation of policies around the **right to citizenship**. Aside from a close investigation of ODA spending and the requirements attached to this spending, the IDC should additionally consider the extent to which the recent UNHCR's #IBelong campaign¹⁶ made a difference around the issue of statelessness and the success of the UK contribution within this. Lastly the ODA should explore how the UK can support the newly launched Global Alliance to End Statelessness¹⁷.
